


Delivered free to over 4000 homes in Whiston.


enrolled for her first loathsome job for a little marathon and has joined a bible study group. Thanks be to God.

We now no longer have a waiting list. She then gave a synopsis of the year's speakers and our year's events, including the Christmas party, a very busy year!

We then had the groups annual reports, all saying how well they had gone and all had welcomed new members. The competition winners for the year were 1st Meg Sewell 2nd Carol Hanneman 3rd Wendy Coates.

Four committee members were retiring and the new committee members were introduced. Margaret Kay-president, Shirley Mowatt-secretary, Rona Hudson-refreshments, Angela Jackson-outings and Jean Robinson-enterprises contact.

Marilyn then gave her report on speakers during the year, and a report on our trips, also mentioning our stall at the Whiston Fayre, saying that we had given £350 to Rotherham Hospice from this event. She then thanked the committee members for all their hard work during the year, and gave out gifts to retiring committee and other members. She then went on to say that she had thoroughly enjoyed her term as president and thanked Helen the secretary, she said she couldn't have done the job without her. Lastly she encouraged us all to get more involved in all aspects of the WI.

Helen than thanked Marilyn for all her hard work as president, and for the fun she had brought to our meetings. Saying that Marilyn had totally got the ethos of the WI and what a good job she had done. There were a few emotional moments during these two speeches.

Whiston Heritage Society

The Whiston Heritage Society recently met in the Parish Church. A good turnout was treated to two short contributions by Mr. Savage and the Chairman.

The first talk concerned the changes in more recent times to areas of the village, the loss of some of the older buildings and the appearance of newer ones, e.g. the Lonsdale Club and the Church Institute. Other aspects of the talk showed how the roads in the area had been modernised and it was even suggested that this might not be sufficient for traffic in the near future. This was illustrated with reference to alterations to West Bawtry Road, The Cross Roads and Worry Goose Island.

The talk also covered the provision of suitable playing areas for football and the introduction of more modern leisure activities like bungee jumping and the Brass Band Festival into the village. The second talk covered the development of the provision of transport to and from the village. It showed how the horse and cart had given way to the tramways and then the single and double decker buses with Whiston being the first route to have a double decker service in 1946. Old timetables were shown and the buses were run by Rotherham Transport and Wigmores. It would appear that the Sitwell Arms was a favourite place for photographs of these buses to be taken.

The meeting also discussed the possible opening of the Manorial Barn on National Heritage Day this year as many comments had been received following the non-opening last year.

Similarly comments from villagers had revealed the popularity of the booklets and another was being planned. This was to cover leisure in the village.

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Dear friends,

As I write it's raining outside, as it has been most days this week. There are severe flood warnings again across the country. Rivers are bursting their banks and many areas such as the Somerset plains are flooded. The upheaval caused by these floods is causing distress to many, as their lives have been disrupted. Many farmers have had to make the difficult decision to find a safe location for their life stock or send them to auction. When the floods have subsided the clearing up process will take months.

In the middle of such devastation there have been glimmers of hope as local communities have pulled together to help one another. Help for those affected has come from the military, fire and rescue services, the police and other organisations. Churches in the flood affected areas have made their halls and buildings available providing refreshments and places of rest for volunteers and workers employed in the emergency, or being the clearing house for offers of accommodation. Other help has come from further away including two tractors pulling 15 tonnes of silage and hay that made the long journey from Wakefield to Bridgewater.

In some of the difficulties we face in life perhaps, like me, you have been moved by the support which has come from people you might not expect. We

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Crime Prevention

Put the brake on cycle crime!!

In recent weeks we have seen an increase in the theft of pedal cycles from sheds and garages, and in some cases gardens, in Rotherham. The bikes that have been stolen range in value from £50 right up to one that had a value of £4000 (I've paid far less than that for cars!). Given this, I thought that this month I would offer readers some advice on cycle security.

First of all if you own a bike, make a note of it's

Secondly, when using your cycle, never leave it unattended and insecure. Even if you are only leaving it for seconds, secure it using a good cycle lock (visit www.soldsecure.com to find examples of quality cycle locks). Ideally secure your cycle with it's lock, to an immovable object, such as railings, ensuring first that it is legal to do so.

Consider carefully where you store your cycle when it is not in use. Many bikes these days are worth more than the shed the owner chooses to store them in. Given this, a shed may not be the best storage location. Wherever you choose, lock your cycle (using a quality padlock and chain, again see www.soldsecure.com for examples) to a ground anchor (examples www.soldsecure.com) that itself is secured into a cement floor, brickwork or a strong part of the building's fabric. And look towards including this building as a zone on your household alarm system, or install a battery operated alarm in the building. Regardless of the value you place on the bike.

try not to leave it insecure and unattended in the rear garden of your home, overnight or during daylight hours.

Finally, use a permanent ultra violet marker pen (ink visible only under ultra violet light), to write your postcode and house number on two separate parts of the bike. You can buy one of these pens from a good DIY store, for around a pound. There are more sophisticated cycle marking kits available, aswell. Please visi www.securedbydesign. com to find kits that attract Police support.

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Ulley Café Day Events
